



Max Hosier

September 16, 1922 - June 8, 2013

CEDAR FALLS-Max Merle Hosier, 90, of Cedar Falls, died Saturday, June 8, 2013 at his residence in Cedar Falls.

He was born September 16, 1922, in Fairbury, Nebraska, the son of Forrest and Olive Roland Hosier. He married Janice Aleene Kimsey August 4, 1946, in Farragut, IA.

Max served his Country in the United States Navy during World War II and for 20 plus years in the Navy Reserves. He received his BA degree from Peru State Teachers College and both his MA and PhD degrees from the University of Northern Colorado, Greeley. He taught 4th-6th grades at Price Laboratory School and later was a Professor of Reading and Language Arts at the University of Northern Iowa, retiring in 1988.

Survived by his wife of Cedar Falls; three sons, Chuck (Diane) Hosier of Waterloo and Perry and Andy Hosier, both of Cedar Falls; four grandchildren, Tonie, Kayla, Paul and David; and five great grandchildren, Justin, Lucie, Ava, Alana, and Clint.

Preceded in death by one son, John B. Hosier; and one brother, Forrest Hosier.

Visitation will be from 4 to 7 p.m. Tuesday, June 11, 2013 at the Richardson Funeral Service in Cedar Falls. Private family services will occur at a later date.
