March 13, 1936 - January 26, 2011

CEDAR FALLS-Dr. Norris M. Durham, 74, of Cedar Falls died Wednesday, January 26, 2011 at his home in Cedar Falls.

He was born March 13, 1936, in Philadelphia, PA, the son of Archie M. and Frieda E. (Russell) Durham. He served his country in the United States Air Force. He was united in marriage to Louise Hackenberg in 1971 in Detroit, MI. She died February 16, 2010. He received his Master of Arts degree from New York University and his PhD from Penn State University. He was employed as a professor of anthropology at Wayne State University, Detroit, MI from 1970-1974, University of Wisconsin-Green Bay from 1974-1979, and at the University of Northern Iowa from 1980 until his retirement in 2002.

Survived by two nephews, Donald J. Hackenberg of Milesburg, PA and Dennis R. Hackenberg of Unionville, PA; niece, Diane M. Gates of Runville, PA; mother of Philadelphia, PA; sister, Frieda Crampton of Philadelphia, PA; step granddaughter, Riki Duck of Loganton, PA; and step great grandson, Bryton W. Duck.
